# Spotlight on... Local celebrity Jonny Wright by Dawn Thomas

Jonny Wright has recently moved to Furzedown with his wife and baby daughter. He is a screenwriter, whose current work "Little Darlings" can be seen on Sky Kids and NOW TV.Little Darlings, a Jacqueline Wilson novel adapted for television, tells the story of a young Black girl who discovers her dad is a famous popstar

Dawn and Lynn (FCN committee) interviewed Jonny at The Furzedown Pub in February to discover a little more about his life and work.

#### Why did you choose to live in Furzedown?

My wife and I were looking for a bigger house; our family was expanding so we needed more space. We liked the vibe of Furzedown; the community feel of Moyser Road with its small independents like Life of Fish appealed to us. Furzedown is quieter, less built up than many surrounding areas and has great access to Tooting Commons. I sort of knew the area having lived in Avoca Road many years ago and rented in Brixton, Dulwich and Streatham. It also has good access to my in-laws who live in Surrey.

#### What do you like about living in Furzedown?

Its great community spirit. We have joined our street WhatsApp group where people look out for each other, and we are getting to know our neighbours. I'm a Yorkshireman and it reminds me of home as the people here are friendly. I love the fact that people offer items that might be useful to others, we recently got a rocking horse via our street WhatsApp group, perfect for our daughter.

#### How did you get into writing?

After graduating with a History and Politics degree from the University of Liverpool, I came to London to do an Masters in Acting at ArtsEd. Drama School. At the end of my course I performed a series of monologues and out of all the monologues I performed, my drama teacher (Adrian James) loved the one I had written. I had decided to write an original piece as I couldn't find any that were Black and Northern. My original piece really impressed him and he encouraged me to develop it into a full length play. The play was commissioned by the Talawa Theatre Company, which then helped me get involved with Soho Theatre, The Royal Court and RADA doing playwriting groups. The Talawa success also led to me writing a film for Film4 and a sitcom which helped me to gain lots of experience as a screenwriter.

#### How did you come to adapt Jacqueline Wilson's bestselling book Little Darlings into a mini-series?

I hadn't really done much writing for kids before, but my new agent Julia Tyrrell suggested doing the JW book. I managed to get down to the last four writers to be considered and then pitched my vision for the show via Zoom but the link went down halfway through the pitch! Despite that it went well, Jacqueline Wilson was then sent a recording of my pitch and together with Sky and the production company (Kindle Entertainment) JW approved me and another writer (Nathan Bryon) to co-write the whole series.

Kindle Entertainment gave us a lot of freedom. Most of the main characters are Black and many of the behind scenes crew were also black. We saw this production as more than just a Diversity and Inclusion tick box exercise, where you might have a few Black characters on screen but no-one behind the scenes. We wanted to ensure there was diversity behind the camera as well as in front of it. I'm pleased Little Darlings achieved this.

#### What next?

The film version of Little Darlings will be released in April and I'm hoping there will be a second series of the TV show as well. I'm currently writing an original script, a drama/comedy for Sky, and a film with the BFI (British Film Institute), so lots in the pipeline.

### What's your favourite coffee shop in Furzedown?

I'm afraid my favourite coffee shop isn't in Furzedown, it's just on the perimeter – MUD, in Tooting. But I really don't have choice as to which one can be my favourite because MUD is owned by my wife and brother-in-law!

#### What's your favourite restaurant?

Well, we haven't been out that much since the birth of our baby daughter but were really pleased that a branch of Smoke and Salt has opened in Tooting. We used to go to the one in Brixton, and we do love Balham Social for takeaways.

#### What's your favourite pub?

Again, we haven't been to any pubs since we've moved in over 6 months ago, but really like the Furzedown. Someone recommended the Wheatsheaf at Tooting Bec, but we hope The Furzedown will become our go-to.

### If you were Mayor for a day, what would you do?

I would reduce all public transport costs and improve accessibility on the Tubes. I really struggle with a pushchair at some Tube stations. I would increase the number of buses and Tubes to really encourage people to leave their cars behind and use public transport. The empty buildings across London need looking at as well so I'd look at housing too... maybe too much for just one day...

### What's your guilty pleasure?

I absolutely love a romcom, from good ones like When Harry Met Sally to not so good ones like the 2019 US TV series of 4 Weddings and Funeral. I just love love!

Thank you to Jonny for talking to us. We wish him the very best with his upcoming projects. Don't forget that Little Darlings is on Sky 1 now and available on streaming service NOW.

# **Furzedown Lodge**

A brief insight by local historian Helen Long

When I moved to Furzedown, now over 30 years ago, I began to research its history and was amazed when I found out the number of famous and infamous people who had lived here. Unfortunately, only two historic buildings remain. One is Furzedown House with its barrel-vaulted conservatory, which still survives as part of Graveney School today. The other is Furzedown Lodge. This has been mentioned on the chat group lately as it is in dire need of repair. So, I will start with its history.


It was built as the lodge to Furzedown House in 1862 replacing 2 earlier lodges. Furzedown House had been built by Jacob Yallowley, a wealthy city banker in 1794, but by the 1860s it was owned by Philip Flower a very wealthy businessman. He employed one of the fashionable architects of the time, James Knowles Senior to build a barrel-vaulted conservatory on the west of his house and a brand new one-storey lodge. We now know this building as Furzedown Lodge, and this was built at the end of Furzedown Drive.

The lodges housed the estate gardeners. In the 1901 Census the gardener is named as George Hambleton who lived here with his wife, son and widowed daughter. The Seely family, who had bought the estate from Philip Flower, sold it around 1903 and the roads we know today were laid out for housing from 1905 onwards.

Wandsworth Council bought a lot of the land and established a teacher training College at Furzedown House from 1915. However, they kept the lodge and used it to house their own gardeners. In recent times 2 ladies lived there who had been gardeners working for the Council.

The last lady died a couple of years ago and since then the Council seem to have left it uninhabited and neglected. The lodge, though small, is very attractive with a decorated cove and frieze.

We are lucky to have such a lovely building in Furzedown and it must be preserved for future generations.
